Central African Republic & Chad: A year on from the start of the conflict in Sudan

As the conflict in Sudan, reaches its one-year milestone, tens of millions of children and women continue to endure the worst violence imaginable. Over 24.8 million people, which is half of Sudan's population, requires humanitarian assistance after what has become the world's worst displacement crisis. The number of people fleeing the conflict is alarming and children face extreme hunger. World Vision is responding across five countries including Central African Republic and Chad, the latter of which has received more than 700,000 people fleeing conflict.

Localisation and gender equality for sustainable peace

The Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment Act (2022) enacted in Sierra Leone provides the space for at least 30% representation of women in all leadership positions in government and private institutions. Thanks to the United Nations Peacebuilding Fund, World Vision is working in coalition with other agencies on a project aiming to promote peace and security for women in Sierra Leone before, during, and after elections and equip them with the necessary skills for leadership.

Exploring innovative approaches to achieve broader impact



Promoting fairer, more inclusive cities for children

On 14th February, World Vision and its partners officially launched an urban programming approach in Burkina Faso to promote fairer, more inclusive cities where children thrive. Over the next two years, World Vision aims to impact the lives of 500,000 people (51% of whom children) by addressing water, hygiene and sanitation issues (in schools, health centres and homes in remote areas) and improving the sustainable livelihoods and life skills of 20,000 people in urban areas.

Leveraging solar power for enhanced water resource management

With support from sponsors and donors, World Vision has introduced a solar-powered multi-purpose pole to five communities in the Agotime-Ziope District in the Volta Region of Ghana. The purpose of this innovation is to provide reliable first-hand information, facilitate community mobilisation and sensitisation, and bridge the information gap between community members regarding the operation and management of water systems, spiritual nurturing of children, advocacy, and community education on project interventions.

Working together to end child vulnerability for good

Burkina Faso

World Vision's Global Hunger Response aims to reduce acute food insecurity and improve the resilience of 30 million of the most vulnerable people in 28 countries experiencing growing hunger and the threat of famine. In Burkina Faso, World Vision is collaborating with WFP to implement a nutrition project aimed at responding to the most pressing needs of displaced children and families.



Central African Republic

World Vision is partnering with WFP on a school meals programme that is making tremendous impact on the lives of children in Central African Republic. In the lead-up to Africa School Feeding Day on 1st March, a World Vision team embarked on a journey to the town of Bouar to witness the power of school meals in action.
