Wednesday, 19 July at 7:00AM (GMT+2) World Vision's girl changemakers from five African countries (Rwanda, Uganda, Mozambique, Niger and DRC will lead a discussion "Girls' Empowerment and Ending Violence Against Children" to share their experiences, catalyse collective action and hold leaders accountable in ending violence against girls, specifically child marriage and FGM, exploitative child labour, sexual violence, and children associated with armed groups. The event will culminate in a call to action (Manifesto) by the girls to high level decision makers to end violence against girls.
