Lament and Confession

Today we hear the good news - 'unto us a child is born' and we celebrate the child in a manger, Emmanuel: God with us.

This is a time of joy, we see the expectant, happy faces of children around us, we tell them the nativity story of God's great gift of love and how God welcomes all of us into God's family. With their enthusiasm and sense of delight, they return joy to us and surround us with love.

This is a story of deep joy, deep love, not a light-weight fairytale; for this child we celebrate was born into poverty, in an insignificant town,

in a place under the rule of a brutal military regime,

who had to flee from home as a refugee -

this is the child who frees us from our wrongdoing and restores our relationship with God.

God, we believe you see all children as an offering of salvation and the promise of a future; all children as a sign of hope in things that are yet to come, a beacon of light cutting through any darkness. We know all children are loved by you, and precious to you.

So God, we remember all your beloved children who live in circumstances that look like those into which your son was born –

As each of the following prayers are spoken, add the figure of a child into the nativity scene.

We pray for

- children living in war zones,
- and those displaced and living in refugee camps or detention centres.

We pray for

- children living in poverty,
- those who are forced to work in factories and farms for a pittance,
- · or taken from their homes and trafficked into slavery,
- or groomed into prostitution.

We pray for

· children living in violent situations

We pray for

children who have lost hope and for whom there seems to be little they can hope for.

God, it takes a church to end violence against children: we will be that church. It takes faith to believe that violence against children can end: we will believe for our children.
