It is our hope that this collaboration will extend to equally vulnerable schools across the nation.

In times of emergencies, learners and schools face numerous challenges that impede their ability to maintain educational continuity and safety:

- Adequate Learning Spaces: Disasters can damage school infrastructure, making it difficult for students to have a conducive learning environment.
- Basic Educational Materials: In emergencies, students often lack essential learning tools like desks, books, and stationery.
- Safe and Secure Infrastructure: Schools need fortified buildings to withstand disasters, ensuring the safety of students and staff.
- **Financial Resources:** Schools require funds to implement disaster preparedness plans and recover quickly from emergencies.
- **Community Support:** Involvement from the community and local businesses is crucial to provide ongoing support and resources.

Today signifies our stand as Basotho, standing up and saying, "No more will we turn a blind eye to the plight of our most vulnerable." Today is about realizing that the future of our nation lies in the hands of our children, and it's our responsibility to ensure they have access to quality education, regardless of the challenges that may come their way.

I am humbled and immensely grateful to each and every one of you who have answered the call, who have refused to sit idly by while our children's education hangs in the balance.
