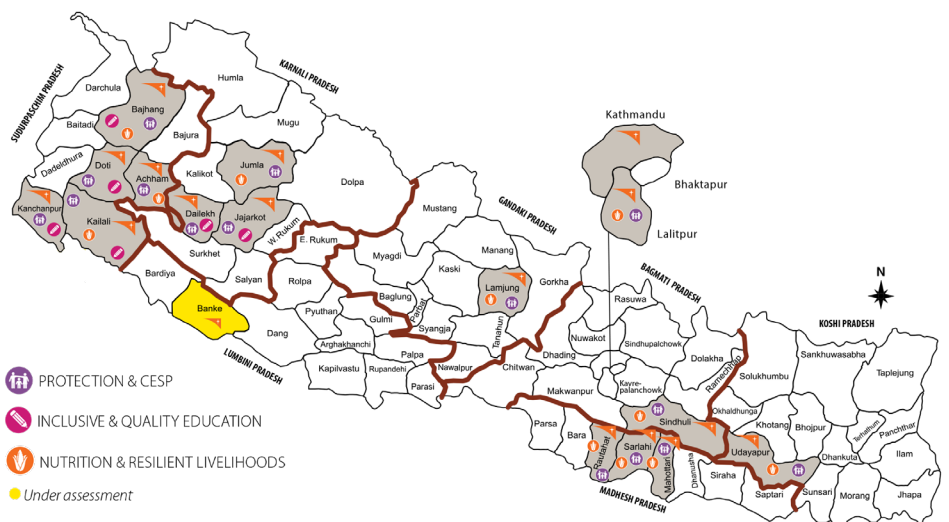

PRIORITY SECTORS



INCLUSIVE AND QUALITY EDUCATION

1,118 children accessed nonformal education through 'Tole Shikshya' (community-based lessons) and **42** mathematics teachers received refresher training for grades 4 to 8.

3,420 Reading Awareness Workshop sessions were held with parents and **714** vulnerable children were supported with educational supplies.

8,331 children from grade 1 to 3 attended after-school reading and learning activities in the community level through **334** reading camps.

40,230 copies of story books distributed in schools and reading camps, promoting improved reading and literacy skills of children.

20 school buildings, **40** classrooms, **20** gender inclusive toilets, and **26** drinking water schemes constructed.

90 schools supported with book corner and child-friendly seating arrangement.

49 ECD centres provided with play-based learning materials and training to the teachers.

Multi hazard risk assessment done in **75** schools, mock drills carried out in **80** schools, and school safety plan developed in **90** schools.

15 story books in the local Rana Tharu language published to help promote literacy among students from the Tharu communities.

333 children with disability supported with assistive devices, individualized education plans, and home support.

12,640 students in **80** schools learned safety skills through mock drills on earthquake and landslide.



RESILIENT LIVELIHOODS

A total of **41,910** people (**34,538** women) reached through different interventions

70% of **800** households supported during disaster response were able to recover back to normal.

More than **8,000** producers (73% women) in **365** producer groups engaged in market-led production increased their production by at least **30%**.

More than **5,500** members (86% women) of **278** Saving for Nutrition (S4N) groups are practicing positive saving behaviours and improved household income and expenditure management.

337 Ultra Poor households graduated out of poverty after fulfilling locally developed criteria.

499 people equipped with skills required by the market through vocational training

81 households started receiving social protection schemes after the project's facilitation.

45 Climate schools were completed enabling more than **2170** farmers in practicing climate-smart agriculture practices.

ADVOCACY AND CAMPAIGN

Collaboration with Government at all levels resulting in **24** policy wins in various sectors.

5 wards in Lamjung, Udayapur, Sindhuli and Kathmandu declared as Child Friendly Local Governments in 2023.

It Takes Nepal to End Child Marriage Campaign concluded with **40** policy formation and **400,000+** people reached. The campaign also stopped **500+** child marriages and many more prevented.

ENOUGH Campaign, a three year long initiative to end child hunger and malnutrition launched globally and planning commenced for Nepal's launch.



HEALTH AND NUTRITION

15,744 children registered in Positive Deviance Hearth sessions, a community-level food based program, had improved nutritional status by the end of the sessions.

7 drinking water schemes constructed benefitting **228** households and **360** handpumps installed at households benefitting **2,127** people with improved access to water.

61 Citizen Voice and Action (CVA) groups formed and developed health service improvement action plans.

56 health facilities assessed on quality of health services where **52%** reported improved services based on the community scorecard.

6,481 pregnant women, mothers and caregivers of 0-59 months old children supported with nutrition and counselling.



CHILD PROTECTION

5,893 children and adolescents took action to support ending violence against children through Rupantaran sessions, community initiatives and campaigning activities in their communities.

156 Rupantaran groups empowered with life and protective skills to prevent and respond to all forms of violence.

7,106 parents reached through positive parenting sessions to adopt positive behaviour towards their children.

1,379 community members reached through different child protection related messages against harmful social norms and practices, child marriage and substance abuse.

35 Local Child Rights Committees (LCRCs) are actively functioning with CRC operational guideline.

41 local governments established child funds which help children who need special protection to access services and reduce protection vulnerabilities.



DISASTER RESPONSE

14 Local Disaster Management Committees and one Local Emergency Operation Centre strengthened with emergency and rescue equipment for disaster response

60 Ward Disaster Management Committees formed and **45** of them supported on functioning

106 Community Disaster Management Committees formed and functionalized

Hazard (earthquake, flood and landslides) specific simulations conducted in **75** schools

90 school safety plans updated

1,719 households affected by landslides, flood, earthquake, cold wave, fire and wind storm supported with food and non-food items in 10 districts.



NEPAL INNOVATION LAB (NLab)

Nepal Innovation Lab (NLab) is a space facilitating with the enabling tools, knowledge, and connections to turn good ideas into action, and fostering inclusive and innovative solutions within the organization and beyond.

In FY23, the NLab piloted the PIPER project in Kailali district transforming 1200 kilograms of waste plastics into Polyfloss: a cotton candy-like insulating fiber. Roofs of 12 classrooms of two schools of Kailali district were insulated using the polyfloss which have helped in reducing the temperature of classrooms up to 4° Celsius. In FY24 PIPER project will be scaled up to benefit 24 classrooms of 6 schools in Kailali.
