WORD FROM NATIONAL DIRECTOR



Dear readers. I am delighted to share with you our 2023 annual report.

I would like to reiterate my thanks and encouragement to our dedicated

staff and volunteers, who have worked tirelessly in the most difficult, demanding areas especially in the current context of our country to bring transformation in our communities.

The year 2023 has been crowned with success and significant achievements and impact. The following pages provide a summary of World Vision International's contribution in Niger to improve the living conditions of children and their communities through interventions.

In our sponsorship programs, World Vision ended the year with 43,029 Nigerien children enrolled in programs in the regions of Dosso, Maradi, Tillaberi, Zinder and Tahoua, thanks to donors from the USA. Canada. New Zealand, Korea, Taiwan and the UK.

Community water supply, sanitation and hygiene were stepped up, reaching 353,179 people with water, hygiene and sanitation through the construction of 398 taps, 10 new boreholes and the rehabilitation of 21 old boreholes.

In the field of education, World Vision has helped to improve the reading and writing skills of 107,115 children through its emergency education project funded by Education Can Not Wait, and the Unlock Literacy

implemented by World Vision. approach

In the area of health and nutrition, World Vision continued its efforts in the fight against malnutrition and in child health and immunization projects. 48,598 people benefited from nutrition interventions through the positive deviance hearth approach and young child feeding, Our health projects reached 227,894 people during 2023. World Vision supported the government of Niger to vaccinate 16,869 children (8391 girls and 8478 boys) against tuberculosis, diphtheria, whooping cough, polio, measles, yellow fever, meningitis and diarrhea.

The savings program has enabled women to overcome countless challenges, including those related to the health, nutrition and education of theirchildren, as well as mobilizing more resources for household resilience. More than 486 savings and credit groups from the most vulnerable strata of society have managed to mobilize more than 884,221 USD and to grant credit of around 267,925 USD to 12,150 members.

I would like to reiterate my heartfelt thanks to the Government of Niger, to the communities, to the administrative, customary and religious authorities at regional, departmental and communal levels, to the donors and to the other partners for believing in our ability to make a significant impact in the lives of children.

RESOURCE ACQUISITION AND MANAGEMENT



main mission of the Resource Acquisition and Management (RAM) Department is to coordinate initiatives aimed at mobilizing the funding necessary to achieve World Vision Niger's objectives. This department operates according to an annually revised resource acquisition business plan aligned with the organization's strategic objectives. This plan sets annual funding targets and identifies priority donors and partners. In terms of management, the department ensures the efficient handling of received funds, in compliance with contractual obligations. This involves the timely implementation of projects and programs, the production of high-quality reports and maintenance of regular communication with donors and partners.

Key impacts achieved during the fiscal year

During the 2023 fiscal year, World Vision Niger committed to mobilizing \$12,254,900 in funding. By the end of the fiscal year, the organization succeeded in securing more than \$34,303,697 in new funding from private, public and in-kind food resources for food aid programs.





WATER, SANITATION **AND HYGIENE (WASH)**



The WASH technical program is designed to achieve World Vision Niger's Strategic Objective 1:



ensuring that

"all children, particularly the most vulnerable, and their families benefit from improved sanitation, hygiene and safe water for consumption, production and processing".

This should contribute to the overall goal of sustainable well-being for children, families and communities, especially the most vulnerable, through the elimination of waterborne diseases.

The NI-WASH program will utilize an integrated water sanitation and hygiene model. This model essentially aims to provide all members of communities and institutions (schools, and health care facilities) with sustainable WASH services by 2030, including the most vulnerable community members.

To observe more significant changes in WASH behaviors at the population level, the NI-WASH program will utilize SBC models and approaches that reach more households over a longer period at a relatively low cost. The program will utilize more evidence-based models for households' behavior change, particularly the Care Group's "Trios" model. Compare to other non-CG behavior change approaches that primarily use CHWs, the Care Group approach has lower cost per beneficiary and has been shown to have a doubling of behavior change and achieve a better 52% reduction in estimated child deaths. The approach was also found to have doubled the adoption of handwashing with soap (average increase of 43 percentage points in CG projects versus 20 points in non-CG projects).

FOOD SECURITY AND RESILIENCE



The main objective of the Nutrition technical program is

to improve the nutritional security of children under 5 years of age by 2025.

Savings and credit groups:

Savings groups were established, mobilizing a total amount of 884,221 USD, granting credit worth 267,925 USD to 12,150 members for incomegenerating activities and value chain development.

This contributed to the well-being (education, health, food and other needs) of approximately 20,644 children, including 10,735 girls.



The results achieved in the area of livelihoods have contributed to the availability of nutritious agricultural products for over 6 months of the year, and made food available in our intervention areas, as indicated by monthly monitoring data. This led to a reduction in the number of moderately malnourished children compared to FY22. with 3,026 cases in FY23 compared to 3,775 in FY22.

EDUCATION





The Technical education approach contributes to the strategic objective: Increasing the number of primary school children who can read.

77 Collaboration **WORLD VISION** maintains a close partnership with:

- The Ministry of National Education and its decentralized technical education services
- Regional Directorates of National Education
- Primary education inspections

- Territorial community (School management committee, Decentralized school management committee, Association of Educational Mothers

- Education networks/clusters, including Education Cannot Wait, Plan International, and the World Food Programme.

Target:

Primary school children, from CI to CE1 (primary grade 1 to grade 3) levels

Main Project Model

- The project model is "Unlock Literacy", which aims to strengthen teaching/learning of primary school children from first to third grade and increase community, parental, and educational authority support for children's learning. "Unlock Literacy" encourages reading in children through the five key skills: letter knowledge, phonemic awareness, vocabulary, fluency, and comprehension.
- The CVA (Citizen Voice and Action) project model aims to improve the quality of public service delivery through dialogue among partners, implemented by organized community structures.

Key impacts achieved during the fiscal year

- 107,115 children reached by World Vision's **Education Programs in 2023**

- Thanks to the 154 reading camps initiated in the areas and 174 supported schools,

- over 50% of CE-level students in World Vision's Education technical program schools have mastered basic reading skills.
- Children are monitored and receive quality education thanks to the capacity-building of stakeholders: 45 trainers trained as trainers/ coaches, 211 teachers trained in the UL teaching methodology, 414 parents members of the CGDES (Decentralized School Management Committee) trained/mobilized.

schools received 50 prefab classrooms providing a suitable and protective environment for 2,550 students, including 1,125 girls and teachers.

schools received 592 desks, 82 blackboards and 82 chairs for teachers improving working and learning conditions for 82 teachers and 1,776 students, including 799 girls and 893 refugee and internally displaced children.

students, including 362 girls and 504 refugees and internally displaced persons, each received a school kit (school bag and school supplies).



In terms of hygiene and sanitation, 19 schools received 36 latrine blocks for girls and boys significantly improving the living conditions of 5928 students, including 1852 refugee/ internally displaced students. Previously students had to defecate and urinate in the schoolyard, or nearby homes. Even menstruating girls were able to satisfy their needs without any difficulty.

schools with a total of 4,252 students, including 711 refugee and internally displaced students, each received a water connection. This has

considerably improved the living conditions of students, who no longer need to go home to drink water or to satisfy their natural needs.

schools with a total of 7,026 students, including 1,147 internally displaced students, received from hand-washing kits or water points, contributing to improve hygiene.

CHILD PROTECTION



Child protection is at the heart of all World Vision interventions, to protect boys and girls from abuse, neglect and violence of all kinds;

World Vision implements a technical program within the framework of protection, with the following objectives:

To increase the number of children having peaceful and harmonious relationships within their families and communities:

To increase the number of girls and boys protected against violence;

These two objectives will contribute to the overall goal of



All children are protected from child marriage, abuse, neglect and other forms of violence, and have positive and peaceful relationships with their families and communities.

As part of this program, various strategies, including the following model approaches: "celebrating families, children's clubs, channels of hope" to reach children, parents, guardians... are implemented to reach children, parents and guardians.

ADVOCACY



Advocacy as the third pillar of World Vision's strategy at national level. World Vision has contributed to Niger having a policy for managing nosocomial diseases in the health sector. This strategic tool assists in managing diseases.

World Vision supports communities in local advocacy through the Citizen Voice and Action (CVA) approach.

Through this approach, 16 CVA committees have been established, and nearly 18 advocacy actions have been carried out on health, education, water. and child protection.

Notably, in fiscal year 2023, World Vision assisted members of its 17 intervention programs in the local advocacy process. Of these, 11 programs focused on ITAW campaign advocacy actions to combat violence against children, aligning with world vision's strategic vision for child wellbeing. The 2023 advocacy actions carried out by communities in World Vision intervention areas aimed to modify certain policies or improve their implementation, impacting and improving the well-being of more than 8,808,085 people.

FAITH AND **DEVELOPMENT**





One of the roles of the Faith and Development unit is to mobilize and train religious leaders to actively participate in the development of their communities in general, and to work in particular towards the holistic (spiritual and physical) well-being of children.

To achieve this, in addition to local expertise, we enhance the capacities of religious leaders on faith-based project models and approaches that have proven effective and are contextually appropriate.

Key achievements during the fiscal year 2023

Among other model projects and approaches, we have:

- 825 religious leaders including 521 Muslims and 304 Christians who received training on various faith and development models and approaches.
- The Celebrating Families Curriculum (CFC), Enables families to gain a deeper understanding of their role in the spiritual education and well-being of their children. It is 532 religious leaders that were trained including 294 Muslims and 238 Christians.
- The Enhanced World View (EWV) allows us to understand that development does not come from outside (God has placed the resources necessary for our development all around us, we need to identify them). The program has trained 198 religious' leaders, including 151 Muslims and 55 Christians.
- Do no harm (DNH). Aims to build the capacity of religious leaders in DNH techniques and peacebuilding based on the Word of God. A total of 22 religious' leaders, including 11 Muslims and 11 Christians, have been trained.
- Channels of Hope (CoH). Enables religious leaders to become more competent in responding to the most difficult development challenges. 65 Muslim religious leaders have been trained.

A total of 21,058

children have been reached by the children's spiritual edification activities.

Also, since I took the training organized by World Vision Niger on violence and abuse of children, a great psychological transformation has taken place in me. My behavior and my view towards children who are precious creatures has changed."




