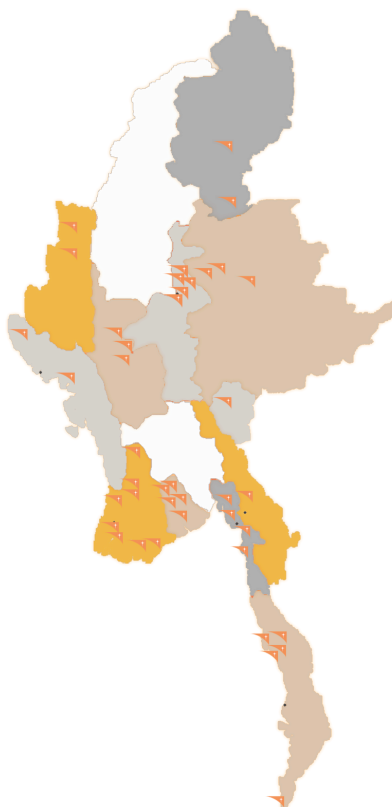

Where we work

Over 30 long-term Area Programmes and over 20 grants/special projects in 12 States and Regions have benefitted 59,626 sponsored children and more than 2.47 million people.

Goal: By 2025 World Vision International Myanmar will be contributing to the measurable improvement in the sustained well-being of 4 million most vulnerable children (MVC) directly and 10.5 million MVCs indirectly, in Myanmar.



Education

Children are equipped with literacy, numeracy and life skills.

- 11,874** individuals received awareness about the importance of education
- 10,514** children benefitted from 216 Early Childhood Care and Development (ECCD) centers
- 236** teachers and 408 management committee members received training on how to effectively operate and monitor ECCD centers
- 6,047** parents received parental education and 2,718 received reading proficiency training
- 13,863** children benefitted through reading clubs, libraries, and hubs



Livelihood and Resilience

Most vulnerable children and families have sustainable livelihood and better food security.

- 12,158** households received agriculture support, including paddy seeds, fertilizer, and water pumps for home gardening
- 6,927** households received livestock and vaccination support to bolster financial resilience and food security
- 493** youths received vocational training to enhance job opportunities
- 1350** individuals received group business training and 35 group business enterprises with 936 members were established
- 1,716** Saving for Transformation (S4T) groups formed with 39,246 members, benefiting 33,648 children and managing a savings amount of USD 23,810
- 1,451** Livestock Extension Workers (LEW) and community mobilizers received training on the effective implementation of livestock activities and LEW kits
- 324** Agriculture Extension Workers (AEW) and producer group members received technical training



Disaster Risk Reduction and Response

Most vulnerable children and families have sustainable livelihood and better food security.

- 50,000** one-liter drinking water bottles were distributed to 476 households affected by Cyclone Mocha in Mrauk U Township
- 126,083.33** USD were provided to 1,513 households affected by Cyclone Mocha with unconditional cash grants
- 1,464,720** P&G sachets were provided to 12,206 households with 54,927 individuals
- 2,233** people including 35 people with disabilities actively participated in the Anticipatory Action Simulation
- 8,424** people including 135 people with disabilities supported with cash grant
- 1,844,513.33** USD of cash was supported to 18,326 individuals, including 5,169 children, 1,204 pregnant and breastfeeding women, and 303 people with disabilities
- 889** MT of blended food and ready-to-use supplementary food (RUSF) was distributed to 13,710 under 5 children and 3,546 pregnant and breastfeeding women
- 1328.38** MT of rice, pulse, salt, and oil was provided to 58,601 people including 10,935 under 5 children and 2,078 pregnant and breastfeeding women



Health, Nutrition, and WASH

Children and communities have access to better healthcare services and clean water.

- 773** community health volunteers were trained to provide quality health services
- 2,844** pregnant mothers received clean delivery kits and 2,702 newborns received newborn kits
- 638** health committees were formed to lead community health activities
- 47,605** mothers/caregivers of under 5 children received health education
- 41,259** children accessed the Growth, Monitoring, and Promotion service
- 64,848** people including 33,429 children received awareness on hygiene promotion and improving water and sanitation
- 8,021** caregivers, pregnant and breastfeeding women received knowledge on infant and young child feeding practice



Child Protection

Children grow up in a safe and protected environment free from all forms of violence.

- 179,122** individuals including 97,315 children and youth received the awareness related to child protection, child participation, child rights, and child-safe online
- 9,050** children were trained on life skills with self-awareness, interpersonal and critical thinking
- 25,356** parents and caregivers including 3,010 children received awareness on celebrating families and positive parenting/discipline
- 652** adult child protection groups and 669 child and youth groups were established and strengthened
- 543** community volunteers were trained on safe migration, human trafficking, and legal process
- 3,573** people received awareness of current migration patterns and safe migration
- 5,858** individuals in 1,075 migrant households supported with basic food items
- 35** children participated in regional/global advocacy events on hunger, digital safety, child sex tourism, and climate change, and 3 child leaders shared their recommendations.



It Takes A World Campaign

WVIM launched its campaign "It Takes Myanmar to End Physical Violence against Children at Home and in School."

- 55,565** children took an active role in educating the community and the public, advocating across all levels to eliminate violence against children
- 369,640** caregivers and 388,013 children received child rights awareness messages
- 4,478** faith leaders actively participated in various campaign activities including awareness raising, community education, and advocacy processes
- 22** public events have been conducted in 17 townships across the country, reaching more than 564,000 people including local authorities and faith leaders
- 11** million people reached through the campaign messages and social media platforms
- 3,251** children participated in the It Takes A World Campaign's May moment and mini-campaign and UNCRC day events
