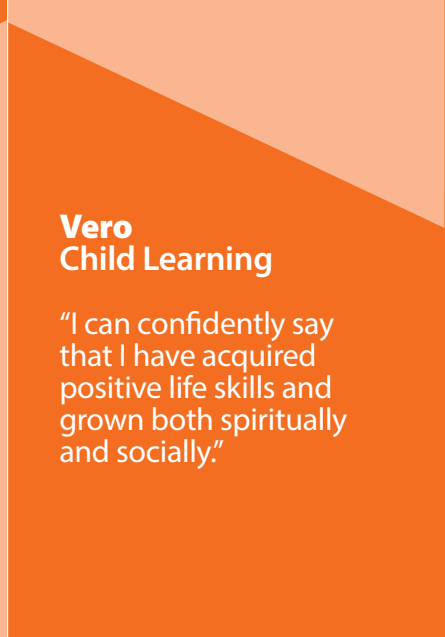

They defined self-awareness as the ability to look inward, think deeply about your behavior, and consider how it aligns with your moral standards and values. More recently, Daniel Goleman (2001) defined Self-awareness as the ability of knowing your emotions, your personal strengths and weaknesses, and having a strong sense of your own worth. With good self-awareness, one is able to build on their strengths, minimize their weakness and appreciates team work.

Those with minimal self-awareness suffer low self-esteem, struggles to fit in teams and are prone to self-defeatist and depressive dispositions. This was the case of King Saul in the Bible .

Conversely, Jesus 'knew that the Father had put all things under his power, and that he had come from God and was returning to God ; ...' He this proceeded Needless to say, selflessness is the hallmark of greatness.

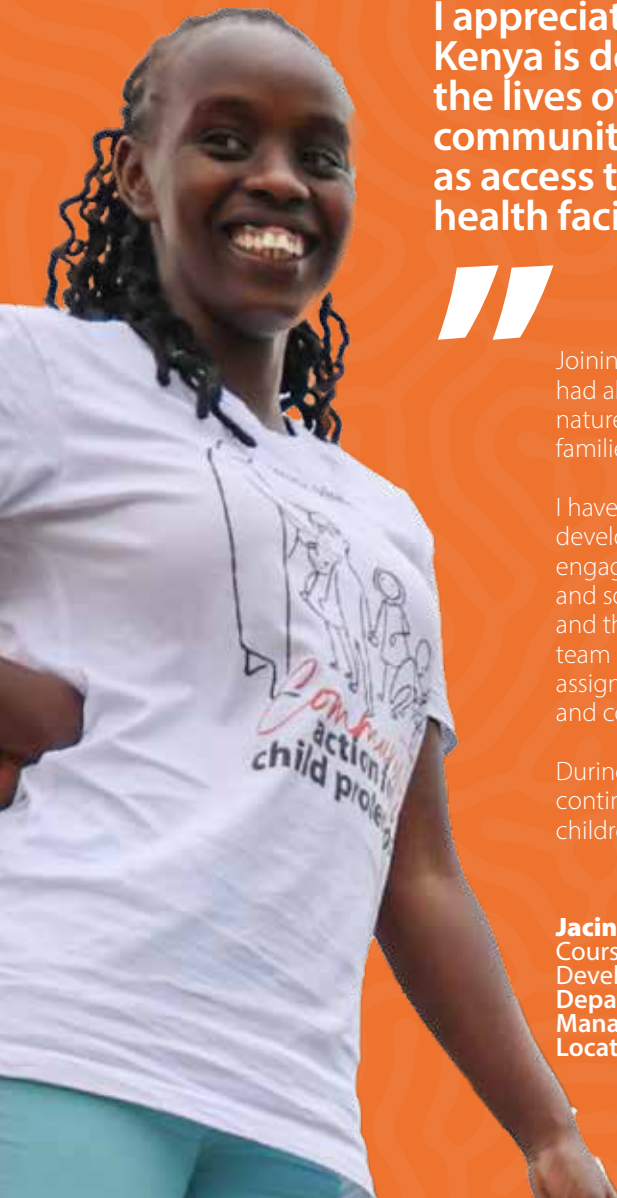

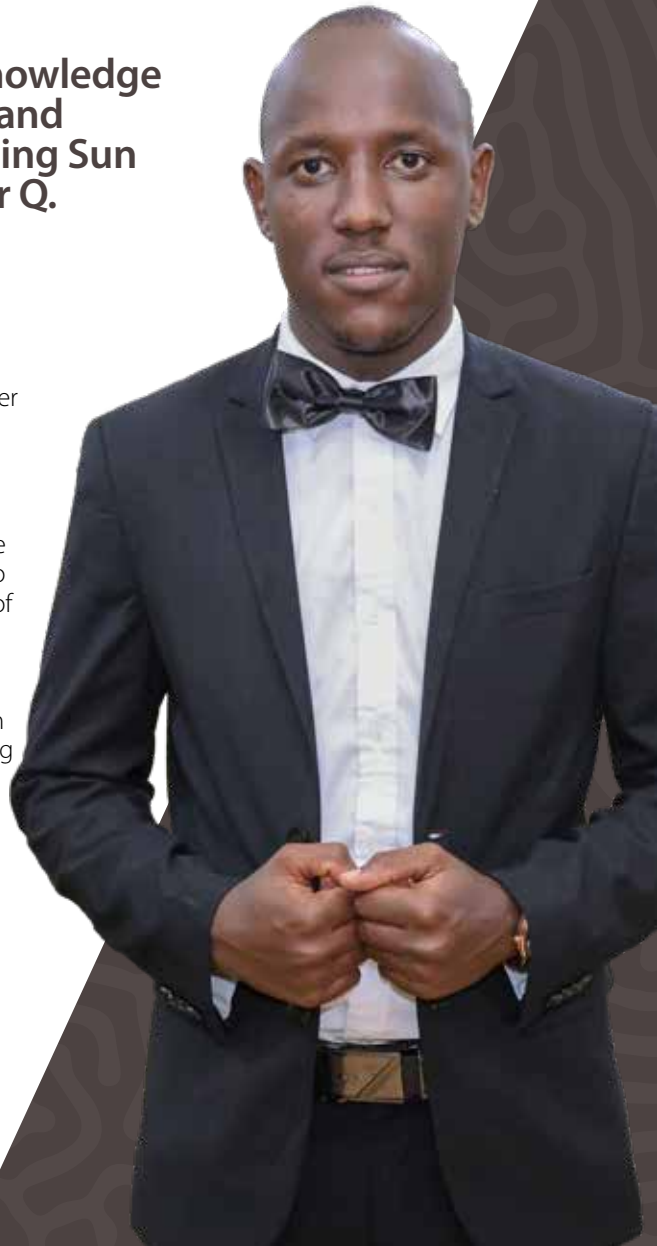
