

Ukraine Crisis Response | August 2024 Fact Sheet

In Ukraine, a 10-year conflict that started in the east of the country in 2014 reached to dramatic escalation of the war since the Russian Federation's 24 February 2022 invasion. It has caused the world's fastest growing displacement crisis since World War II, leaving at least:

- **33.3 million** Population living in Ukraine – **77%** of total Ukrainian population before the conflict (**43.5 million**).
- **14.6 million** People in need of humanitarian assistance in Ukraine – **44%** of Population living in Ukraine.
- **6.8 million** Refugees from Ukraine recorded across globally – **16%** of total Ukrainian population before the conflict (**43.5 million**).
- **3.7 million** Internally displaced people – **11%** of Population living in Ukraine.
- **4.3 million** Returnees – **10%** of total Ukrainian population before the conflict.

World Vision started working in Ukraine in March 2022 through 4 offices in Chernivtsi, Kyiv, Dnipro, and Lviv, which currently support aid efforts reaching conflict-affected people in 24 oblasts across Ukraine.

Ukraine Crisis Response Goal

The Ukrainian children, refugees and IDPs, as well as the host communities in Ukraine, Moldova, Romania, and Georgia have the support to overcome the humanitarian consequences of the war crisis.

Basic needs of vulnerable children, families and communities affected by the war are met in Ukraine and host countries.

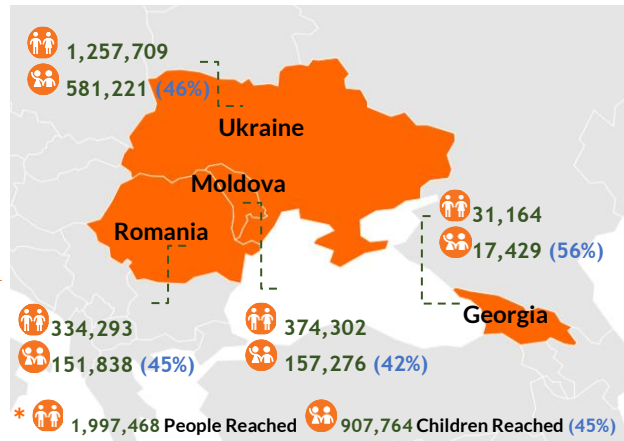

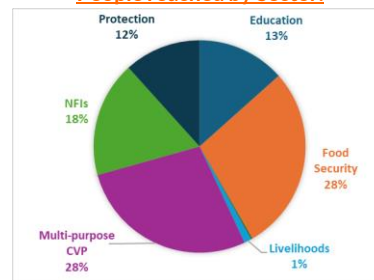
WV UCR Phase 2 Strategy 2024-2026 continues the main Phase 1 directions by integrating humanitarian responses with early recovery and economic development interventions in joint programming with VisionFund, WV's microfinance subsidiary. WV UCR will continue operating in four countries: 70% in Ukraine, 20% in Moldova, 10% in Georgia and Romania.



World Vision UCR:

- August 2024 reporting period in a glance:
- ✓ children reached accounted for **35%** of the overall people reached;
- ✓ **37,149** people reached across UCR, which accounts to **1.9%** of the overall people reached to date;
- ✓ Ukraine – **25,946** (36% of which are children);
- ✓ Moldova – **10,453** (32% are children);
- ✓ Georgia – **658** (41% are children);
- ✓ Romania – **92**.
