

Looking Back on a Year of Plenty

Collaborating and advocating to leave no one behind



Water flows in Burkina Faso's peri-urban area of Roumtenga

In February 2024, World Vision and its partners **officially launched** an urban programme in Burkina Faso with a view to promoting fairer, more inclusive cities where children thrive. In Roumtenga, where host communities and households displaced by insecurity have been living for several months, World Vision has addressed a critical challenge by prioritising water infrastructure to improve access to basic drinking water for community well-being. Since launching the urban programme, World Vision has helped more than 17,000 people (including more than 12,000 children), gain access to clean water. The programme has also provided access to basic sanitation to more than 5,000 people and supported over 59,000 people to adopt healthy hygiene behaviours.

Journeying towards total inclusion in Mauritania

A World Vision survey conducted in June 2024 revealed that more than 2,000 children within our 13 zones of operation in Mauritania are living with a disability. This exercise, whose purpose was to pave the way for targeted actions for World Vision to improve disability inclusion in its programming, further revealed that only 216 of these children (or 10.5%) are currently enrolled in World Vision's sponsorship programmes. With this data and in partnership with the National Federation of People Living with Disabilities, World Vision is laying the foundations for an inclusive future through the Aghorat programme. Through awareness raising and education, this partnership has created momentum towards a Mauritanian society where everyone, regardless of ability, has a place and can contribute.

A groundbreaking initiative to reduce emissions in Ghana

In August 2024, World Vision partnered with Vivo Energy to launch a groundbreaking project aimed at reducing carbon emissions and improving health outcomes, particularly for women in rural areas in Ghana. Called the Eco-Flame Project, the initiative will introduce energy-efficient cookstoves to women in the East Gonja District of the Savannah Region. The project is set to train over 200 women in the use of eco-friendly cooking methods, contributing significantly to environmental sustainability, increased savings, and improved health.



Celebrating 15 years of impact in Kaffrine, Senegal

Fifteen years ago, World Vision began multidimensional development work in Mabo and Diokoul (Kaffrine) in Senegal. As the programme came to an end in July 2024, World Vision celebrates notable achievements that include various advancements in health, education, and women's empowerment through microfinance access. On the path to zero child hunger and malnutrition in Sierra Leone

As part of World Vision's commitment to end child hunger and malnutrition everywhere we work through the ENOUGH Campaign, World Vision rolled out a cash transfer initiative that supported over 500 vulnerable households in the remote region of Mongo in Sierra Leone earlier this year. Children in the Central African Republic speak out on nutrition

In the Central African Republic, malnutrition remains a pressing concern, with a significant portion of the population, especially children, facing food insecurity and inadequate access to nutritious meals. Twenty children aged between 12 and 18 spoke candidly about the fight against malnutrition and the importance of healthy meals at the country's first children's Nutrition Dialogue workshop. The workshop, hosted in November 2024 by World Vision in Bangui, provided a platform for children to share their diverse perspectives, ideas, and potential actions to improve nutrition in their community. This pivotal event highlighted the importance of engaging children in combatting malnutrition and shaping future strategies.

Breaking the silence: Sudanese women's heartbreaking stories from Chad

A forgotten crisis is unfolding in the borderlands of Chad, where the arid landscape stretches for miles. Every week, thousands of women, having survived the brutal ravages of conflict in Sudan, cross into neighbouring Chad, driven not only by the horrors of conflict but also by the sexual violence that has become a weapon of conflict. For many women fleeing Sudan, the decision to leave everything behind is not merely a matter of survival; it is a desperate bid to escape a cycle of violence that has only worsened as the conflict escalates. In refugee settlements like those in Adré, eastern Chad, World Vision is actively supporting Sudanese survivors of gender-based violence, offering a range of specialised programmes designed to provide immediate assistance, long-term recovery, and protection. **Read Article>>**



Bringing smiles to children in Burkina Faso's floodaffected communities

Committed to reducing the vulnerability of populations affected by flooding in the North and Centre-North regions of Burkina Faso, World Vision is implementing multi-sectoral response efforts in collaboration with ACTED, and with funding from Start Fund. This response has enabled the setting up of several mobile child-friendly spaces that have reached more than 2,700 children, helping them to keep up with school activities and overcome difficulties at the beginning of the school year. <u>Read More>></u>

From manual to mobile: Digitising women's savings in Ghana

As part of its **Transforming Household Resilience in Vulnerable Environments (THRIVE) 2030** ambition, World Vision is leveraging the use of technology to create standardised financial tracking, facilitate auditing, support financial literacy, and provide a clear financial history for women's savings groups in Ghana. Through THRIVE 2030, World Vision is supporting savings groups in 12 operational areas across the country to digitise their savings activities through the Dream Save application; a mobile-based financial tool that enables members to overcome data entry errors and the challenges of manual record-keeping, while streamlining the savings process.

Health, dignity and social inclusion in Burkina Faso

Recognised for its expertise in water, hygiene and sanitation, World Vision continues to mobilise communities to work together to build resilient, efficient, accessible and safe water and sanitation services for all. Interventions such as Ventilated Improved Pit (VIP) latrines at schools take gender and inclusion into account by separating latrines into sections for girls, boys and people with disabilities. For Noura, a second grade student, this represents the end to students being exposed to numerous infections and risks of abuse and sexual violence, especially for young girls.



Exploring the dynamics of child marriage in rural Sierra Leone

Child marriage has long been a significant problem in Sierra Leone, with detrimental effects on female education, maternal mortality rates, and the perpetuation of poverty. Effective policies, measures and social behaviour change initiatives are critical to ending child marriage and promoting healthy adolescent development in rural Sierra Leone. World Vision's new report, *"Exploring the Dynamics of Child Marriage in Rural Sierra Leone: A Qualitative Study of Socioeconomic & Cultural Implications"*, highlights the urgent need to address child marriage, and recommends targeted interventions that address the root causes and promote children's rights.

The knock-on benefits of savings groups through a Mauritanian mother's eyes

To Mollel, a mother in Mauritania, World Vision's introduction of savings groups in her community has been "a life-changing experience". Before savings groups were introduced in her village, she struggled to make ends meet. Despite her best efforts, Mollel lacked the resources to pursue her true passion, sewing, which for her remained a distant and unattainable dream. With a small loan, she has not only achieved this dream, but has gone further to purchase a solar panel that is benefitting her entire community.

Partnership Spotlight

Working together to end child vulnerability for good

No organisation or government working alone can solve child vulnerability. World Vision's partners include governments, civil society organisations, faith communities, faith-based organisations, businesses, academia, and more. In this edition, discover some of the impact that World Vision is making through our collaboration with the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) in communities across West and Central Africa.



Central African Republic

Youth empowerment represents a fundamental element of long-term economic and social development. In collaboration with USAID's Bureau for Humanitarian Assistance, World Vision has initiated a project to train and equip young people in Bambari, Central African Republic as part of a larger project to strengthen livelihoods and community assets for conflictaffected communities in the region. The long-term ambition is to promote the economic recovery of the local population by providing skills and employment opportunities for young people.



Senegal

Awarded the USAID-funded Governance for Local Development Plus (GoLD+) programme in Senegal earlier this year, World Vision will collaborate with six local organisations to strengthen the capacity of local governments to mobilise resources and provide public services that are high-quality, accessible, and equitable for citizens. Over the next four years, GoLD+ will operate in six regions across the country: Kolda, Sédhiou, Kédougou, Tambacounda, Ziguinchor, and Dakar.
