Isabel Gomes Disaster Management Global Lead In 2024, the Global Humanitarian Overview (GHO) reports that **116 million people were reached** with at least one form of humanitarian assistance. Despite collective efforts to better prioritize and target assistance, funding shortfalls have forced agencies to make impossibly difficult decisions about who and when to support; only 43% of the GHO was covered in FY24.

More than 305 million people will need humanitarian assistance in 2025. This equals one in every 27 people on the planet. The 2025 appeal as outlined in the Global Humanitarian Overview is US\$47.4 billion to meet the needs of 189.5 million people targeted.
