World Vision provided humanitarian assistance to 10 million children, reaching a total of 18 million people, including 2 million refugees, and over 260,000 persons with disabilities.



Imagine if a big storm, floods or earthquake happened, and many people lost their homes and didn't have enough food or water. Humanitarian assistance is when people, sometimes from all over the world, come together to partner with and support communities and help those in need. They bring food, water, medicine, and other important things to help people survive and rebuild their lives.

Humanitarian assistance is also about preventing and strengthening preparedness in case another disaster or conflict situation happens. We partner with communities on solutions to build resilience so that they are ready, tell us what they need and can also help themselves.



Why is it important?

When bad things happen, like natural disasters or wars, people can be in a lot of trouble. They might not have a place to live or enough food to eat. They might need medical care or support. Humanitarian assistance helps them get through these tough times. It's like when you help a friend who fell down and got hurt – you're being kind and making sure they are okay.

Why should we care?

Assisting others is important because we are all human beings with the same rights. All children have the right to be protected from harm, abuse, and neglect, and have the right to grow and develop, and to reach their full potential. This includes access to education, health care, and a clean environment. Helping others also makes the world a better place. When we support people in need, we show kindness and make sure everyone has a chance to be happy and healthy.

Helping millions of children

A policy is a set of rules, ideas or plans that help people make decisions. Policies can be made by all kinds of people, groups, businesses, organisations or governments. Policies are important because they shape the way we do things.

World Vision's work has helped 92 million children in East Africa by changing 90 important policies. These changes include:

■ 36 policies to protect children from harm, like stopping bad practices such as female genital mutilation, corporal punishment, child marriage, and gender-based violence.

■ 25 policies to make sure the government gives money to programs that stop violence against children.

World Vision launched the ENOUGH Campaign which aims to reduce child hunger and malnutrition. This is aligned with the Sustainable Development Goal 2: Zero Hunger - Did you know that The Sustainable Development Goals, or SDGs, are like a big plan to make the world a better place for everyone. There are 17 goals in total, and each one focuses on something important that we need to fix or improve.



Challenges in the region

Countries in the East Africa region continue to face many challenges, including conflict, climate-related problems (floods, droughts, landslides, heatwaves), food insecurity (people not having reliable access to enough safe and nutritious food to live a healthy life) and disease outbreaks. These crises have increased humanitarian needs.

Listening to children's voices

World Vision believes children's voices matter, and that your participation is crucial in decision-making on issues that affect your lives. Some of the ways we have worked together include:

Ensuring children's voices were heard during important events like the Africa Day for School Feeding and the 1st Pan African Girls and Women Education Conference. This means they made sure that what children think and feel was shared with everyone.

Children's advisory group

We started a special group called the Children's Advisory Group. This group has children from eight different places. They help us understand what children need and give us ideas to make our work better.

Amplifying children's voices

We partnered with children to ensure they could share their thoughts and ideas through many fun and important clubs, like: School-based clubs, Sports clubs, Life skills clubs, Children journalists' clubs, Spiritual nurture clubs, Children's councils. These clubs help children learn, grow, and share their voices.

Day of the African child

We also took part in celebrating the Day of the African child in Uganda. We talked about how important it is to make sure no child is hungry because being hungry makes it hard to learn.




Helping with education plans
