HOPE IN ACTION

World Vision has been serving the most vulnerable children across the Middle East and Eastern Europe (MEER) region for the past 50 years. We are leading the way in highly fragile contexts to ensure the most vulnerable children in the hardest-to-reach places are also supported, including children on the move and those affected by armed conflict. We currently work alongside local partners responding to humanitarian crises and operating long-term development projects that address gender disparity and other contextual issues in 15 countries across the region, including Albania, Armenia, Georgia, Bosnia and Herzegovina (BiH), Romania, Ukraine, Moldova, Iraq, the West Bank, Lebanon, Yemen, Syria, Jordan, Türkiye, and Afghanistan.

Due to ongoing conflicts, violence, global hunger, and climate change, humanitarian needs continue to spike, with more people than ever – 70.6 million in just the Middle East, North Africa, and Eastern Europe – dependent on humanitarian aid in 2024. In response, World Vision is prioritising cash and food assistance, food security, and livelihoods programming in Afghanistan, Lebanon, Syria, and Yemen under the organisation’s Global Hunger Response. We are also working towards ending child hunger and improving child malnutrition through our global ENOUGH campaign.

We cannot do it alone. Empowering local actors to lead the response, recovery, rehabilitation and development in their countries is a top priority, and building their capacity supports us to achieve our goals of ensuring every girl and boy has what they need to live a life in all its fullness. We partner with supporters, governments, local communities, faith leaders, civil society, faith-based organisations to support the needs of children and their families throughout the region.

OUR WORK reaching the most vulnerable in 2024

reached over **9.4 million** people across the MEER region

out of which **7 million people** (52% of whom were children) were reached in response to humanitarian crisis and disasters across 14 countries.

out of which **2.4 million people** benefitted from long-term solutions aimed at improving children's education, strengthening child protection, helping families diversify and grow their livelihoods, improving access to clean water and nutritious food, and building resilience.

including **4,930,232** children

3 out of every 5 people reached were women and girls.

9 out of every 10 children reached were the most vulnerable.




OUR IMPACT reaching the most vulnerable in 2024


- 72 policy changes** and more than 14,400 supporter actions addressed the root causes of vulnerability for millions of children.
- 50+ child protection projects** implemented in 15 countries, engaged more than **650,000 women, men, and children** in activities aimed at ending violence against children.
- 250,000 children** and their caregivers benefitted from mental health and psychosocial support.
- 545,834 girls and boys** received support to continue and/or improve their education.
- 125,000 people** supported through faith leaders and faith-based organisations to transform harmful social norms and practices.
- 2 million people** gained access to clean water.
- 900,000 people** in 10 countries received **US\$99 million** in cash and voucher assistance.

MEER offices worked with

357 local partners

in 2024 in development and humanitarian contexts to enable more effective delivery of aid and fulfil our Grand Bargain commitments.

Our donors and supporters enabled us to deepen our commitment to the most vulnerable girls and boys.

On average, **MEER offices successfully won 1 new project every 2 days with over US\$312 million received** in new acquisitions in cash grants, private funding, in-kind food and cash and vouchers.

MEER CONTEXT

Climate change presents the single biggest threat to human development and its widespread impacts disproportionately burden the poorest and most vulnerable households in fragile and rural developing contexts, particularly women and children. In the Middle East and Eastern Europe, extreme weather events such as flooding, droughts, dust storms, heatwaves and mega fires are increasing in frequency and intensity due to climate change. This is having a devastating effect on food security, nutrition and personal security due to forced migration (IOM 2022). World Vision MEER operates in 16 countries, where ECA programs priorities are addressing vulnerabilities to climate events.

In the Middle East, young people between the ages of 15- make up around 30 percent of the population and face the fastest growing youth unemployment rate in the world. In Eastern Europe, young people make up around 16 percent of the population and despite the access to health and educational services, show alarmingly low rates of employment and civic participation.

World Vision considers meaningful participation of children and positive youth development (PYD) as cornerstones to locally-owned sustainable change.
