In FY-24, World Vision International Lesotho made significant strides in integrating Goods-in-Kind (GIK) resources into various programs, reaching numerous beneficiaries and households.

The organization focused on improving educational environments, enhancing maternal and child health services, and supporting vulnerable families. Key achievements included distributing school furniture to multiple schools, benefiting students, and providing essential health resources to the Ministry of Health, reaching many children. Additionally, GIK resources supported disaster-affected families, human trafficking victims, and child labor projects.

The Sponsorship/Child Protection program distributed clothing, shoes, and children's winter jackets, benefiting numerous individuals. These efforts have strengthened partnerships, increased organizational visibility, and improved the well-being of vulnerable children and communities across Lesotho.

World Vision International Lesotho is dedicated to serving the most vulnerable children across all clusters and Area Programs where we operate. In FY24, our efforts were aimed at integrating GIK within our programs, targeting beneficiaries with special vulnerabilities and improving relationships with partner organizations and supporting stakeholders that protect, support and help us identify vulnerable children and adults in the communities we work with. In FY24 we received and distributed GIK worth \$905,005.79 and reached over 800 households and over 3,000 beneficiaries.

•Shipments Received: 3 shipments of school furniture comprising 715 pieces of desks, chairs, tables and whiteboards.



Improved learning conditions, attendance for students and improved results. 200 desks distributed to two schools was a collaboration with ECHO CSDRR and Ministry of Education and included construction of new classrooms and refurbishment of old ones.

Impact: Enhanced project funding, stronger partnerships, and increased organizational visibility, credibility and impact.

- •500 clothes, 179 pairs of shoes, 234 blankets, 50 mattresses and 46 bed springs allocated to HEA which were ultimately used to support 268 families affected by disasters throughout the country.
- •168 clothes, 45 pairs of shoes, 2 office chairs and desks allocated to the Promotion and Protection of Human Rights (PPHR) project which were requested on behalf of WVIL local NGO partner Beautiful Dreams, that works with victims of human trafficking.
- •5 desks and 5 chairs allocated to the new WVIL Child Labour project.
- 7 chairs allocated to CVAVAC (Citizens Voice Addressing Violence Against Children) to furnish the children's court donated by the project to the Ministry of Justice, Lesotho
- •10 chairs and 13 office desks used to furnish new Menoaneng Area Program Office. 60 office tables were donated to school to furnish staff rooms, 3 village chief's offices and 2 police station Child and Gender Protection Unit offices.

Impact: Supported vulnerable families and children with day-to-day clothing and jackets for school and cold weather.


